

CHRISTINE O'DONOVAN

In the early 1990s Mason Hayes & Curran acquired its first contemporary artwork. The piece was Self Portrait by Irish artist Michael Kane, and the acquisition was made one winter's evening at the Rubicon Gallery in Dublin. It was chosen by Colman Curran and Declan Moylan, who subsequently became Mason Hayes & Curran's de facto first art committee. From the early 1990s a pattern of semi-surreptitious and half-authorised acquisitions continued for some years.

Since these modest, if somewhat clandestine beginnings, through the stewardship of a small team of visual art enthusiasts, the firm has expanded and developed its collection by select and careful acquisitions of mainly Irish, but also some international, contemporary works.

Since 2006 the growth of the firm and our expanded space in Barrow Street has provided us with enhanced capacity which has gradually been filled and populated with visual artworks – paintings, prints, commissioned artworks and sculpture - and provided us with lots of scope for imaginative and inspirational displays. Our office is the home to the specially commissioned sculpture by Corban Walker which soars up the building's atrium. As part of our support for visual arts we have commissioned a number of other pieces over the years many of which are visible in public area through the firm.

The collection gives pleasure and inspiration to Mason Hayes & Curran's staff and visitors, and marks the firm as one of Ireland's main supporters of the visual arts in the professional and business sectors.

The beauty and diverse nature of the collection is a tribute to and a small part of the legacy of Declan Moylan and Colman Curran as first partners to foster and encourage support of visual arts and also to the many others who have participated in the Art Committee over the years, some of whom continue to work in the firm. Each member of the Committee has influenced the selection and acquisition program during their tenure and left behind the glow of their personalities.

We are very grateful for the enthusiastic efforts of each art committee member over the years. The collection would not be what it is today, without it. We appreciate the continued support of the Partners and staff of the firm for their engagement and encouragement of the visual arts. Art is not just a gift to be enjoyed and consumed today, it has an enduring benefit of providing pleasure and giving inspiration for the future and all those who come to Mason Hayes & Curran.

We look forward to expanding our collection by supporting new and emerging contemporary artists based in Ireland in the years ahead.

Christopher Banahan b.1958

Christopher Banahan has lived in Ireland since 1993. He is originally from England, where he studied Fine Art at Nottingham Trent University and at Goldsmiths, University of London.

Since the early 2000s, Banahan has presented numerous solo exhibitions in Ireland and England, and his work has been featured in many group exhibitions across Europe. He is represented by the Doorway Gallery, Dublin.

Vermeer Head (Girl with Pearl Earring) is typical of Banahan's reflective portraits of childhood, in which children's faces are viewed with a certain posed formality through patterned fabric screens.

Brian Bourke HRHA b.1936

Brian Bourke was born in Dublin and is based in Galway. He studied at the National College of Art and Design, Dublin and St. Martin's School of Art, London. He is an elected member of Aosdána and an Honorary Member of the Royal Hibernian Academy, Dublin.

Bourke's work has been exhibited in Ireland, England, Switzerland and America. His works display a great affinity and sympathy for his subject matter, and above all, a wonderful sense of humour.







John Boyd b.1957

John Boyd was born in England and currently resides in Ireland. He graduated from Newcastle College of Arts and Technology in 1996. Boyd's work is represented in numerous collections both public and private in Ireland and abroad.

Hippopotamus I and Porcus VIII draw from Boyd's studious observations of small model animals. Set against a background of muted blues, the animals stand stoically in defiance of interpretation.





Thomas Brezing b.1969


Hotel Irlanda 2007-2011 Oil on canvas, 200 x 400cm

Thomas Brezing was born in Germany and moved to Ireland in the 1990s. He has exhibited widely in Ireland and also in Germany, Wales, Finland and Belgium.

Brezing has been the recipient of several Arts Council Awards and his work is included in numerous collections around Ireland. Hotel Irlanda was painted between 2007 and 2011, a difficult time on many fronts in Ireland, and the painting aims to depict this by showing a cluster of buildings in a restless landscape either in the process of being built or deconstructed.

Brown has shown in numerous group exhibitions in Ireland and the UK. In 2012, he was a selected for inclusion in *The 182nd RHA Annual Exhibition* at the Royal Hibernian Academy, Dublin.

Breakdown, Calamity and Monstrosity explore the romance of modern ruinous structures. These unfinished buildings are not falling into ruin, but instead have risen to meet it.







Andrew Clancy

Andrew Clancy is a Dublin-based sculptor. He graduated from the National College of Art and Design, Dublin in 1991 and subsequently lectured there in Bronze Casting.

Clancy has exhibited extensively in solo and group exhibitions throughout Ireland and he

has completed several public commissions. His work is held in public and private collections in Ireland. He is represented by the Cross Gallery, Dublin.

Mitsubishi A6M2b Zero, Messerschmitt Bf109E and Supermarine Spitfire MK1a are from Clancy's series of sculpted model aircrafts entitled *The Boys*.

Diana Copperwhite was born in Limerick and is based in Dublin. She Graduated from the National College of Art and Design and later completed an MA in European Fine Art at Winchester School of Art and Design.

Copperwhite has exhibited extensively both in Ireland and internationally. She is represented by the Kevin Kavanagh Gallery, Dublin.

Copperwhite's work deals primarily with memory. Her concern is the creation of something informed by the act of remembering, the overall aim of which is to suggest an instance where "reality, memory and fantasy collide".



Garrett Cormican b.1976

Garrett Cormican was born in Dublin. He is a painter and author of the critically acclaimed monograph *Camille Souter The Mirror in the Sea*.

He practised Life Painting at the National College of Art and Design, Dublin from 1991 to 2002.

Cormican held the solo exhibition Past, Passing, or to Come at the Taylor Galleries, Dublin in 2013 and has been featured in multiple group exhibitions.

What is past, or passing, or to come? is inspired by the city of Istanbul and takes its title from W.B. Yeat's poem Sailing to Byzantium.



John Cronin b.1966

Dublin artist John Cronin is an abstract painter and graduate of the National College of Art and Design, Dublin.

Cronin has presented his work regularly since the late 1980s, participating in exhibitions in Ireland and abroad. His work is included in an extensive range of collections both in Ireland and abroad and he is represented by the Green On Red Gallery, Dublin.

The primary concern of Cronin's work is abstract painting in the age of artificial intelligence. *ZXX* is a record of its own construction; thin layers of translucent colours are built up and worked into, covering the aluminium sheet.



Rowena Dring b.1970

Rowena Dring was born in England. She currently lives and works between Amsterdam in the Netherlands and Burgundy in France. Dring graduated with an MA in Fine Art from Goldsmiths, University of London.

Dring has partaken in many group exhibitions internationally and solo exhibitions across Europe and in the US. Intrigued by the idea of the western American landspace as one huge movie set, Dring took a road trip through California and Arizona in 2006. *Barker Dam, Joshua Tree* is based on the photographs that she took on this trip.

Simon English was born in Liverpool. He studied at Crawford College of Art and Design, Cork and later graduated from Liverpool College of Art with a BA in Fine Art.

English has exhibited widely, with many solo exhibitions both in Ireland and abroad. His work has also been included in group exhibitions across Ireland and in New York. He is represented by the Cross Gallery, Dublin.

English limits himself with regards to subject matter in *Scene 27* and *Scene 30*; a lone concrete building in an empty landscape. He creates a tantalisingly recognisable visual world of poignant emptiness and abundance.

Mike Fitzharris b.1952

Mike Fitzharris was born in Limerick and lives and works in Dublin and Marbella, Spain. Fitzharris received a BA in Fine Art from the Limerick School of Art and Design.

Fitzharris has represented Ireland in exhibitions in Canada, France, Slovenia, Wales, Belgium, Northern Ireland and England. He has also presented many solo exhibitions across Ireland.

Fitzharris has received many awards for his work, including the Eigse Award, Carlow Arts Festival; a Royal Ulster Academy award; an Arts Council of Ireland award and the Taylor De Vere Award, Royal Hibernian Academy, Dublin.

Port and Estuary portrays an aerial landscape in which Fitzharris juxtaposes elements of actual place and memory in bright colours and textured surfaces.





Patrick Hall b.1935

Patrick Hall was born in Tipperary and works between London and Sligo. He studied at Chelsea College of Arts and later Central Saint Martins, University of the Arts London. Hall was appointed a member of Aosdána in 1982.

He has exhibited widely in Ireland, the United Kingdom and the United States of America.

Regarding clouds as somewhat permanent, with *Primordial Cloud*, Hall questions our notion of duration and construct of time.

Martin Healy b.1967


Ganzfeld Study I 2007 C-prints mounted to acrylic, 160 x 122cm

Martin Healy completed an MA in Fine Art and a BA in Fine Art at Crawford College of Art and Design, Cork. Healy has had solo exhibitions both in Ireland and abroad and has also participated in an extensive list of group exhibitions in Ireland, the US and in Europe.

He has received many awards in Ireland and internationally including the Arts Council of Ireland's Visual Arts Bursary several times.

Ganzfeld Study I belongs to the photographic series The Sleep of Reason, which explores the symbolism associated with images of birds of prey.





Ronnie Hughes b.1965

Ronnie Hughes was born in Belfast and studied at the University of Ulster at Belfast, graduating with a BA and an MA in Fine Art. Hughes is a Lecturer in Fine Art at the Institute of Technology Sligo. He has exhibited extensively both nationally and internationally, also participating in a vast array of group exhibitions.

The titles of Hughes' works such as Sequence make reference to many different fields of expertise. Chemistry, biology, astronomy, botany, music and mathematics all involve formulae and theoretical structures, and offer a starting point for his images.



Sophie Iremonger b.1983

Sophie Iremonger was born in Dublin. She has been based in London since 2014, having previously lived and worked in Berlin for six years. She graduated from the National College of Art and Design, Dublin with a BA in Fine Art Painting in 2008. Iremonger has exhibited extensively in Germany, Ireland, London and New York.

Set in a summery post-apocalyptic landscape, *Unwanted Seduction In Pleasure City* expresses the temptation to betray one's lover when surrounded by opportunities to do so.

Eithne Jordan lives and works in Dublin and the South of France. She studied at Dun Laoghaire Institute of Art, Design and Technology, Dublin and at the Hochschule der Künste in Berlin. Jordan was elected a member of Aosdána in 1990 and a member of the Royal Hibernian Academy in 2009. She has exhibited widely, with solo exhibitions across Europe and in Ireland.

Jordan's work is represented in major public and private collections in Ireland, Europe and America and she is represented by the Rubicon Gallery, Dublin.

Bikers III and Brewery XI are part of a body of work that focuses on the contemporary urban environment.

Michael Kane b.1935

Michael Kane was born in Wicklow. He lives and works in Dublin having graduated from the National College of Art and Design. He studied at the Graphic Studio, Dublin from 1961 to 1963. Kane co-founded Project Arts Centre, Dublin in 1967. He is a member of Aosdána.

Kane has been exhibiting regularly since 1960, presenting solo exhibitions in Ireland and the UK. He is represented by the Rubicon Gallery, Dublin.

Kane's expressionist paintings typically depict large figures or landscapes.





Bartosz Kolata b.1979

Bartosz Kolata is originally from Poland and has lived in Dublin since 2005. In 2006 he graduated from Nicolaus Copernicus University, Poland securing an MA in Art Conservation and Restoration.

Kolata was awarded the Kinsale Arts Festival Manifest Prize in 2012 and was winner of the Irish Art Award in 2007. Kolata's work is represented in private collections in Europe, the US and Colombia as well as public collections.

On the Way is from Kolata's early work which focuses on simple moments in everyday life.

Gillian Lawler b.1977

Gillian Lawler was born in Kildare and is based in Dublin, having graduated from the National College of Art and Design.

Lawler has won numerous awards for her work including the Arts Council of Ireland's Travel and Training Award; the Golden Fleece Award Merit Prize; the Culture Ireland Award; the Arts Council of Ireland's Visual Arts Bursary and the Hennessy Craig Scholarship. Her work is represented in many public and private collections.

Urban Mountain explores ideas concerning architectural unease, referencing imaginary, fictional landscapes that explore a dystopian science-fiction terrain.


Aidan McDermott b.1952

Aidan McDermott is a Dublin-based artist. He graduated from the National College of Art and Design, Dublin with a BA in Fine Art in 1991.

McDermott has exhibited extensively throughout Ireland and has won numerous awards for his work. In 2002, he won the Irish Artists Fellowship Award, Vermont Studio Center, USA and was awarded a fellowship by the Ballinglen Arts Foundation, Mayo in 1999. His work is held in many public collections in Ireland.

McDermott uses plasticine as a modelling agent to sculpt small heads in a somewhat exaggerated form so that the play of light upon their features might convey a human expression, feeling or presence, as depicted in *Morphic Head*.



Stephen McKenna PPRHA b.1939

Stephen McKenna was born in London and now lives and works in Ireland. McKenna studied at Slade School of Fine Art, University College London. He was elected a member of Aosdána in 1999 and of the Royal Hibernian Academy, Dublin in 2002. In 2005 he was elected President of the Royal Hibernian Academy.

McKenna has exhibited extensively both nationally and internationally. McKenna's work is held in the collections of the Arts Council of Great Britain; Berlinische Galerie, Berlin; Contemporary Art Society, London; Ulster Museum, Belfast and the National Gallery of Ireland. He is represented by the Kerlin Gallery, Dublin.

In *Terrace at Ronzano*, we see a sun-soaked terrace in late evening, demonstrating McKenna's passion for Italian landscape and architecture.



Margaret Morrison b.1965

Margaret Morrison was born in Dublin and is currently based in Mayo. She is a member of the Achill Artists Group.

In 1989 Morrison won the Taylor Art Award, Royal Dublin Society. Her work is represented in the collections of the Bank of Ireland, the Office of Public Works, the Mayo County Council and the AIB.

Carolyn Mulholland RHA b.1944

Carolyn Mulholland was born in Armagh and studied at the Belfast College of Art, graduating with a BA in Fine Art Sculpture in 1966. She was elected a member of the Royal Hibernian Academy in 1984 and a member of Aosdána in 1990.

Mulholland won the Irish-American Cultural Institute's O'Malley Award in 1992; the Royal Ulster Academy Silver Medal Award in 1973 and the Ulster Arts Club prize for Sculpture in 1965. Her work is represented in the collection of the Vatican and the Bar of Northern Ireland.

Falcon and Tiger come from the series Airfix Days which captures the childhood memories of two men through their innate bond over play. New York View comes from a series of photographs in which O'Brien looks at the city of New York from a new angle.

O'Dea has won many awards for his work which is held in multiple collections in Ireland. O'Dea is represented by the Kevin Kavanagh Gallery, Dublin.

Sauve Tan was featured in O'Dea's solo exhibition Trouble (Kevin Kavanagh Gallery, 2012), one of a trilogy of shows dealing with the Easter rising and its aftermath.





Mark O'Kelly b.1968

Mark O'Kelly lives and works in Dublin and Limerick. He graduated from the National College of Art and Design, Dublin in 1990 and the Slade School of Fine Art, London in 1992. He is a lecturer in Fine Art at Limerick School of Art and Design.

O'Kelly's work is held in many private and public collections around Ireland. He is recipient of several awards including the Arts Council of Ireland's Artists' Bursary Award in 2004 and 2005 and the Golden Fleece Merit Prize 2004.

Bridget Riley b.1931

Bridget Riley was born in London, where she currently lives and works. She studied at Goldsmiths, University of London and at the Royal College of Art, London.

Riley has exhibited internationally since 1962, presenting solo exhibitions worldwide. Her work is represented widely in public collections.

She won the International Prize for Painting at the Venice Biennale (1968). In 1963 Riley was awarded the AICA Critics Prize and the John Moores Liverpool Open Section Prize.

Riley's abstract works explore optical illusions, the use of colour and ideas of form and shape.



Norbert Schwontkowski b.1949; d.2013

Norbert Schwontkowski was born in Bremen, Germany. He was a professor of painting at the Hochschule für Bildende Künst at Hamburg.

Schwontkowski exhibited regularly in galleries and public institutions throughout Europe since the late 1970s. He was also the subject of a special exhibition at the Rubell Collection in Miami in December 2005. Schwontkowski's work is represented in several museums. He is represented in Germany by Contemporary Fine Arts, Berlin and Produzentengalerie, Hamburg, and by the Kerlin Gallery in Dublin.

Many of Norbert Schwontkowski's paintings depict simple figures or objects isolated against a dense, gloomy ground. In *Elektric Blossom*, these subdued, earthy tones become punctuated by the "electric" glowing white orbs of the plant.



Sean Scully b.1945

Sean Scully was born in Dublin and raised in London. He now lives between New York and Germany.

Scully's work has been featured extensively in major exhibitions worldwide since 1973 and is held in many private and public collections. He is represented by the Kerlin Gallery, Dublin.

Inis Meain Wall II is part of a photographic series from 2005, focusing on the Aran Islands' characteristic architectural feature, the ancient dry stone walls, which crisscross the islands' barren terrains.

Blaise Smith ARHA b.1967

Blaise Smith lives and works in Kilkenny having studied at the National College of Art and Design, Dublin. In 2012, he was elected an Associate Member of the Royal Hibernian Academy, Dublin.

Smith's work has been exhibited widely throughout Ireland. He has won many awards for his work, including the Royal Ulster Academy Irish News Prize and The RHA James Adam Salesroom Award. Smith is represented by The Molesworth Gallery, Dublin.

Point Five Heavy Machine Gun, a portrait of the modern weapon, was created along with thirteen other paintings during a period in which Smith was granted access to the Irish Army's weapons.



Eleanor Swan b.1959

Eleanor Swan is a ceramic artist and lives in Newbridge, Co. Kildare. She works from her studio at Russborough House in Wicklow. Swan graduated from the National College of Art and Design, Dublin in 2006 with a BDes (Ceramics) and an MA in Design (Ceramics) in 2010.

Swan has exhibited both nationally and internationally, presenting her work in the US, Europe and China. Her work is in many private and public collections in Ireland and abroad.

Just Listen comes from the body of work entitled A Thoughtful Silence which is about human existence; how we react to one another and the reactions we provoke in others.
